- identify conflicts early
- balance competing priorities
- challenge assumptions objectively
- focus on long-term project success

Why independence matters

Projects become more successful when decisions are based on:

- business objectives
- measurable value
- project risk
- lifecycle costs
- operational requirements

—not on commercial interests.

The client's single point of responsibility

Independent project management provides:

- one central coordinator
- one communication channel
- one reporting structure
- one project overview
- one independent recommendation

This reduces complexity while increasing transparency.
